Dear Colleagues

New York Health Forum (NYHF) is pleased to host a health disparity forum entitled "Stomach Cancer Disparity: Overcoming the Barriers." The forum is scheduled for September 28, 2023 (Thursday) from 4 to 6 PM at the Barrymore Film Center in Fort Lee, NJ.

Stomach Cancer disproportionately affects non-White minority groups, especially Asian Americans and Hispanic Americans, with the greatest impact on Korean Americans. A recent US-population-based analysis showed that among the age group generally considered for cancer screening (age>49), there is more than 10 times higher risk of gastric cancer in Korean Americans compared with the non-Hispanic White population. Despite these alarming statistics and decision model analyses showing that endoscopy for gastric cancer screening in these high-risk groups could be cost-effective, there is no guideline for gastric cancer screening in the US.

The primary goal of this forum is to galvanize community-physician partnerships for stomach cancer campaign movements to collectively explore innovative ways to help governments develop screening guidelines for stomach cancer in the US for high-risk populations.

We hope you will join us at the forum, and we look forward to working with you to further empower our community.



On behalf of the Korean Physicians in NY/NJ of International Medical Alumni (KNI), I congratulate NYHF on organizing Stomach Cancer Disparities: Overcoming the Barriers. This is a crucial topic that demands greater attention and action from the medical community and policymakers.

In Korea and Japan, the 5-year survival rate for stomach cancer approaches 70%, while in the US, it is only 33%. The primary reason for this difference is the existence of national gastric cancer screening programs in Korea and Japan, which involve gastroscopy every other year from age 40 onwards. These findings strongly warrant preventative strategies for the affected ethnic groups in the US.

KNI is a non-profit organization of Korean-American physicians dedicated to serving as a valuable resource to the broader community. We aim to promote professional development, networking, education, and research among our members and partners and expand our community service initiatives, especially addressing health disparities that affect our community.

Dr. Hyun has served as a Board Member of the New Jersey State Board of Medical Examiners (2017- 2018). He has also served as the president of the Korean American Medical Association (2011-2013) and is the founding President of the World Korean Medical Organization (2012-2015). He has founded several nonprofit health organizations such as the Center for Viral Hepatitis and Asian American Stomach Cancer Task Force, and published articles on ethnic health disparities in the US. Dr. Spinnell is board certified in gastroenterology and in internal medicine. He has special interest in advanced endoscopic procedures, including ERCP, EUS, and stenting. He did his internal medicine residency, and was chief resident, at Albert Einstein College of Medicine-Montefiore Medical Center, where he also received his gastroenterology training. As a hepatobiliary and gastrointestinal cancer surgeon, he has performed hundreds of surgeries related to cancers of the liver, pancreas, stomach, and esophagus, as well as rare gastrointestinal tumors (carcinoids). He has specific interests in treating diseases affecting the Asian American population both in NYC Chinatown, Flushing and the A.A. community in Bergen County.Dr. Brower is a Founding member of Imigastric, the largest Global Surgical Trials Group Investigating Surgical Approaches to Gastric Cancer Worldwide. He served on the executive Committee of the ACOSOG Clinical Trials Group. HE is an editor of the Journal Gastric Cancer published from Sun Yat Sen University in China. Previously, Dr. Brower was professor and vice chair of surgery at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai and the chief of surgical oncology and director of strategic planning and extramural affairs at the Continuum Cancer Centers of New York. He is coeditor of the first evidence-based surgical textbook and author of more than 100 peer-reviewed articles on gastrointestinal and surgical oncology.

Since then, she committed her life's work to serving local and global communities, with a special focus on the Asian American community. Under her leadership and through the establishment of the Asian Health Services, Holy Name Medical Center transformed into one of the preeminent healthcare institutions for the Asian community. Because of its success and innovation, Ms. Choi won numerous industry awards in the US and Korea for creating a best-in-class culturally competent medical care model. Ms. Choi has been active in community services and involved in multiple non-profit organizations as a board member including Bergen New Bridge Medical Center and she also has been recognized with awards and recognitions including White House Award on Vital Hepatitis Screening. Ms. Choi earned her bachelor's degree in business management at the University of Maryland and master's degree in public health from Columbia University.
